Raymond Miltenberger, Ph.D., BCBA-D



Biography

Dr. Raymond G. Miltenberger is the director of the Applied Behavior Analysis Program at the University of South Florida. He is a Fellow and past president of the Association for Behavior Analysis International (ABAI). His research focuses on safety skills, health, fitness, and sports, and staff training and management. He has published over 200 journal articles and chapters and has written a behavior modification textbook, now in its sixth edition. Dr. Miltenberger has received numerous teaching and research awards including the APA Division 25 Award for Distinguished Contributions to Applied Behavioral Research and the ABAI Outstanding Mentorship Award.

Teaching Safety Skills to Children: What Works and What Doesn't?

This presentation will a) review types of safety threats faced by children, with an emphasis on firearm injury and abduction, and the safety skills needed for these threats, b) discuss assessment of safety skills with emphasis on in situ assessment as the most valid form of assessment, and c) focus on the author's research evaluating training procedures to promote the acquisition and generalization of safety skills; both informational approaches and active learning approaches involving behavioral skills training and in situ training. The presentation will end with a discussion of accessibility of effective training procedures.

Reactivity in staff management: do staff continue to do their job when we are not watching?

This presentation describes the author's recent research on staff management and reactivity. Across a number of studies in different settings, the findings show that various staff management procedures result in improved staff performance. However, the results also show that when staff are observed surreptitiously, they do not continue to perform at the same level. The presentation will discuss the problem of reactivity to observation in staff management research and discuss possible solutions to the problem.
